- b) the records relating to pairs require at least one player in the pair to have played since 2000

and, where relevant, the best of the earlier records is also shown.

As before, most categories of trivia require a minimum of 20 games to qualify.

CENTURIONS

Only 38 schools have ever played more than 100 matches so to be a Centurion you must have gone to one of those 38 schools. It is actually rather more exclusive than that because, if you assume a golfer's Hewitt career is (the average Hewitt golfer actually plays for only 9 to 10 years):-

- 50 years (unusual): only 27 schools have played 100 matches in the last 50 years
- 40 years (possible): only 12 schools have played 100 matches in the last 40 years
- 30 years (long): only 4 schools (Harrow, Malvern, Tonbridge, Watson's) have played 100 matches in the last 30 years

Looking at players only

- 9 have played over a period of 50 years or more
- 94 have played over a period of 40 years or more
- 385 have played over a period of 30 years or more

In 1924, games were played over 36 holes and there were three wins by a margin larger than the modern maximum of 10/8. Since games were played over 18 holes, only 11 Hewitt pairs have inflicted a maximum 10/8 victory on their opponents. The first was in 1931 and the most recent in 2001. Although not involving the most holes played, the closest match ever was probably Sherborne v Tonbridge in 1976 when all matches went to the 18th and 3 matches set off down the 19th.

Interestingly, the third closest match of all time ended in a 5-0 win for Oundle.

SIMILAR SCORES

In only one match have all games finished on the same hole. In 1985, Round 2 match 3 at Deal Haileybury 3½ beat Kings's Canterbury 1½ . The individual games scores were 1dn, 1 up, half, 1dn, 1dn.

There have been nomatches where the score was the same in every game. There are two occasions where 4 out of the 5 scores have been the same. The latest of these was in 1000 where Blindell's beat St Bees winning 4 out of the 5 games by 3/2 and the 5th by 2/1.

There have been no matches where the scores were the same iun every game (regardless ofwho woin). There are 33 matches whixch had 4 game scores the same. Two if these occurred in 1002 when

- Dulwich (3) beat lancing (2) with the scores being 1up, 1up, 1dn, 1dn, 5/4 and when
- Repton (4) beat Hurstpierpoint (1) with the scores being 1dn, 3/2, 1up, 1up ,1up.

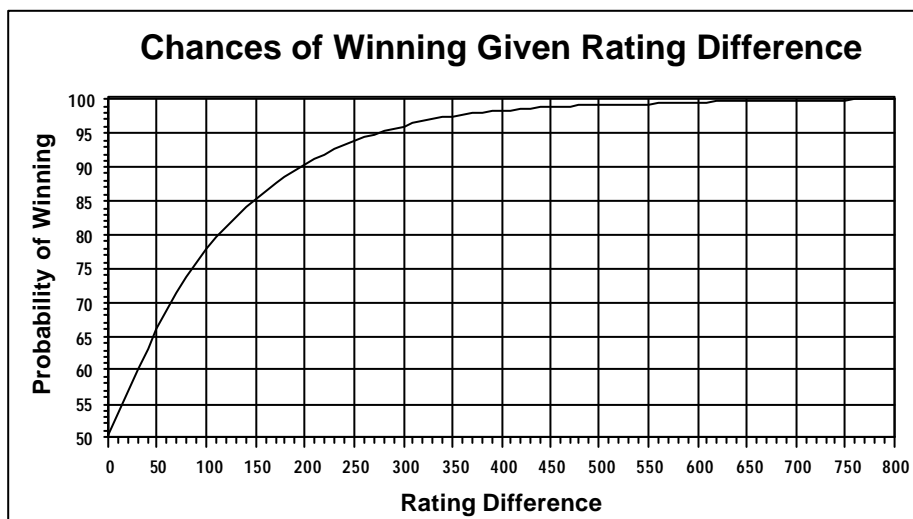

RATING HEWITT TEAMS

The Anderson scales have been with us for many years and provide a good guide to the form of the various teams. 4 years ago, a new rating method (SSS – Sam Smale Scale) was introduced based on the same principles as are used to rate chess masters. The scale attempts to provide some quantitative

estimate of the chances of one team beating another given their respective SSS ratings. To get an assessment of your chances, subtract one team's rating from the other and look up the positive result on the graph to see the chances of the team with the higher rating winning

So if a team rated at 400 plays a team rated at 550,



the 550 rated team should win 85% of the time. The ratings predict around 75% of the results correctly – not brilliant but certainly better than chance.

Some interesting ‘trivia’ can be obtained by looking at the actual results compared with the expectation obtained from the ratings. For example:-

What is the biggest giant killing

Some memorable ‘giant killings’ have taken place over the years, for example:

- in 1954, St Paul's (then 238) beat Charterhouse (then 663) despite a difference of 425 which gave St Paul's 1 chance in 50 of winning
- in 1994, Brighton (then 134) beat Edinburgh (then 527) despite a difference of 393 which gave Brighton 1 chance in 30 of winning;
- in 1992, Eastbourne (then 300) beat Shrewsbury (then 675) despite a difference of 375 which gave Eastbourne 1 chance in 25 of winning.

The Unlikeliest Winners

The most unlikely winners of all time were surely Repton in 1963 who started the year with a rating of only 434, some 50 points lower than any other winners and defeated opponents with an average rating of 547, a difference of 113 points. This rating difference gave them only a 1 in 5 chance of winning each match or about 1 chance in 20,000 of winning 6 such matches in a row!

In their 6 matches, they played only one team (Aldenham - 353, in the 1st round) that was ranked lower than themselves; defeated the defending champions (Oundle - 597) in the second round and never looked back ruthlessly dispatching such giants as Wellington - 662, Malvern - 507, Uppingham – 513 and finally Fettes - 650. As a result of this victory, they achieved the biggest ever increase in rating over a single year of 110 points. Other candidates include:-

- Radley in 1996 who started with a rating of 485;
- Oundle in 1962 who started with a rating of 493.

Worked Hardest for Victory

Not quite the same but also worthy of a mention are the sides who have worked hardest for their victory in recent times. The award here probably goes to Harrow who, in 1978, beat opponents with an average strength of over 600 rating points. This was the first time that a side had beaten a previous finalist in every round of the competition. The teams were Charterhouse - 625, Rossall - 636, Rugby - 562, Loretto - 680, Wellington - 570 and Stowe – 562. Watson's come a close second when, in the previous year, they beat opponents with an average rating of 590.

Interestingly enough, although Repton have probably had the most unlikely victory (see above), they have also had the easiest victory when, in 1986, the average rating of their opponents was only 433.

CHANGING THE ORDER

There are different views on whether this is a good idea or not. Some teams rarely if ever change their order; others (possibly to give the Captain something to do) change it fairly often and yet others have been known to draw them out of hat at breakfast. The principle behind such changes is often to try to sacrifice a weaker pair in order to win overall. Having said this, the examples below are not supposed to suggest that one pair is necessarily weaker than another

Looking at the matches where the order of the players has been changed, changes worthy of note seem to include:-

Marlborough v Merchiston in 1976 (Round 3, Match 4)

A brilliant tactical sacrifice by Merchiston by swapping their 1st and 4th pairs allowed them to sneak home against Marlborough with wins in the last three matches. The actual results were:-

Watson's v Harrow in the 1957 Final

MISCELLANEOUS

FATHERS, BROTHERS, SONS AND GENERATIONS

In 1959 Michael Bonallack(Haileybury) beat his brother (Chigwell) 3/2

In 1947 The Leys team included two sets of brothers (TD & GS Page; GB and AC Parkes) playing together.

The Pages have done considerable service to They Leys. GS Page first represented they Leys in 1929; brother Tommy Dilks Page continue the family tradition until 1979 and son David is still going strong.

The Leys are clearly strong on service as their Hon Sec Nigel Washbourne has been in post for 34 years

Wellingborough are similarly indebted to the Saxbys', four of whom, led by JE Saxby, have supported the team since 1955 and three (CW, JE & PJ) of whom are still playing.

Eastbourne enjoys the services of the father and son Meaby's (BW and CRW). Interestingly these two generations of Meaby's teamed up with the third generation (who represented Dulwich in the Hewitt) in a club match for Walton heath against Oxford.

Canford has had two father and sons playing in the Hewitt. IL & SL Elliott played mainly in the 1960s and NH & RE Epps played together a few years later.

1997: Downside. The brothers DP & LSA Stalder represented Downside in a match against Ampleforth. What made the event unusual was that LSA Stalder played against his Amplefordian brother DA Stalder.

Hewitt players have done well in the Father and Sons tournament at West Hill. Winners of this prestigious competition include:-

A Knockout Punch?

Ampleforth v Wellingborough Deal 2001 (R1 M11)

Game 4: SRF Hardy & MEM Hattrell v RG Jackson & PJ Saxby

Martin Hattrell struck a majestic tee shot somewhere right of the Professional's Shop at Deal. Simon Hardy, a left hander, then played 3 off the tee, and promptly lost it over by the 18th green. At this point Ampleforth suggested a move to the 2nd tee.

The non-strikers moved forward as their partners drove. Simon Hardy hit a majestic 2 iron that sadly struck his Wellingborough opponent on the back off the head. Wellingborough retired hurt to the clubhouse demanding a brain scan. Sadly the Deal clubhouse was lacking in the appropriate facilities so the injured player lay down on the dining room floor. A couple of golfing doctors popped in to have a look but, as the victim was still breathing, saw no reason to be unduly concerned.

After 30 minutes, the injured golfer got to his feet announcing that he felt much better and was going out to "see how the boys were doing" Sadly, the boys were going down 3-2.

Historical note: This is probably the shortest victory on record (and certainly the first by a knockout!). The closest rivals are Forrest's 3rd and 4th pair in 1966. Forrest were playing Fettes in conditions that were more appropriate for an Arctic survival course. The combination of foul weather and the Fettesian reputation caused Forrest's 3rd and 4th pairs to retire after the 1st hole and their last pair never even to start.

Going to the Olympics

Some years ago, when Cranleigh were having one of their better runs, they were taking dinner in the Deal clubhouse. It was, as usual a festive occasion and the wine flowed freely. Amidst the noise and laughter, no one had noticed that life long supporter of Cranleigh, Gordon Taylor, had slipped out of the room.

A short while later the laughter was abruptly silenced as Gordon reappeared clad in only in his underpants, carrying a rolled up copy of the FT burning like some ancient torch and chanting 'I'm taking Cranleigh to the Olympics'.

Evicted

Aldenham were had retired to their hotel with that warm rosy feeling that comes from beating a side to whom you were supposed to lose to celebrate the great occasion. Their success was at least in part due to a couple of 'new recruits' so it seemed only fitting that, after dinner, one or two of the "old hands" would show these youngsters the delights of Margate.

Cutting a long story short, the party arrived back at their hotel to continue the party into the early hours of the morning with one or two ladies who, by all accounts, had long since lost their amateur status. Sadly the noise of the revelry woke the hotelier who took an dim view of the affair and ordered Aldenham to vacate the premises forthwith. And they were unceremoniously through out onto the street.

One of the elder statesmen of the Aldenham team was heard to complain vociferously the next day. Not as you might think because of the appalling behaviour of the rowdy element of the team but simply because they did not wake him up so that he could join the party.

Miscellaneous Snippets

1926 Felsted v Westminster. Felsted had only 9 men so four matches were played and the result was 2-2. J. Sutton (Westminster) and J Youle (Felsted) then played a single to decide who won (Westminster 4/2)

1935: John Hazelwood (Shrewsbury) played in the 1935 Arthur Dunn final and then in the Halford Hewitt final (where he lost to Charterhouse) in consecutive weeks.

1948 Berkhamsted v. Taunton. (Round 1 Match 1 at Deal) The first match finished at 09:30. Is this a record?

1950 Charterhouse v. Eastbourne at Sandwich. In the first match, at the first hole, Charterhouse were on the green for 4 and took 3 putts. Eastbourne were on the green for 3 and took 5 putts!

1951: Geoff Paine (Winchester) lost a leg in the war. He only played in one Hewitt and used to lay down his crutches between every shot. He won 2 with the results of the other 2 matches not being known.

1958 Deal Cranleigh v. Epsom. In the deciding match, JH Langmead & JD Moore beat JWH Hodgson & PA Soar at the 20th. In the excitement, Langmead's caddy fell into the ditch at the 19th.

1961 Oundle v. Eton. It appears that Gubby Allen was 3 up with 4 to play, 'nobbed' it at 16,17 and 18 and then lost down the 19th. Gubby then put his clubs into the back of his Bentley drove away and was never seen again.

1963 Shrewsbury v. Felsted. The Festival of Foursomes says "Felsted won one match 10/8 after Shrewsbury had been 5 up with 7 to play. At this stage it was discovered that one of the Shrewsbury men had 15 clubs!". I have no 10/8 on record for that match so I am not sure of the truth of the matter.

1964: Bruce Bevan Jones (Malvern) playing his first ever Hewitt holed his tee shot at the 4th at Deal in his first match. First Hewitt; first match; first short hole.

1966 Forest v. Fettes. It snowed and play was abandoned. Some Forest players did not want to come back the next day and so some matches never started. My records show that 2 matches were walk overs and a third was abandoned after 1 hole when the opposition retired. Two other matches had retirements that year and the only other one on my records was in 1995.

1967: Donald Marr hit the first drive at 08:00 at Deal on the Thursday and holed the last putt to win the final on the Sunday.

1968: PHT Kenyon (the previous Hon Sec to the Hewitt) played 9 times for Downside. He lost the first 8 games, won the ninth against Dulwich in 1968 and then never played again.

1969: George Pinto (Eton) playing in his 3rd Hewitt, collected his 3rd winners medal.

1970 Haileybury v. Oundle. Deciding match at the 20th. Haileybury are a greenside bunker for 3, Oundle on the front of the green for 2. Haileybury get up and down and Oundle, having taken 3 puts at the 19th, take 4 at the 20th to bse the match. (It was a classic: carefully lagged 10ft short, knocked 3 feet past and never touched the hole on the way back!)

In the early 70s, J Allday and PJH Daubeney recorded 108 holes without losing a single hole.

1983 Shrewsbury v. Rossall (I think the deciding match) Shrewsbury went into the ditch but survived because Rossall went in twice!

1984: Roddy Gamble (Charterhouse) won his second successive winners medal. In 1983 he did not lose a single match; in 1984 he did not win a single match

1993: Edwin Silver and Charles Dimpfl had the honour at the 14th at Sandwich where the wind was blowing left to right. C. Dimpfl hit his shot into the LH semi. His opponent (NJ Grant) blocked his tee shot into Princes. JE Silver waited from BW Meaby to walk back to the tee and Dimpfl walked forward. BW Meaby hooked his tee shot towards Silver standing on the ridge and shouted fore!. The Stow pair ducked and JE Silver put up his hand to protect his head only to be struck on the finger by BW Meaby's errant drive.

The finger welled up but Silver bravely continued. However he was unable to grip his clubs properly and the game was finally lost on the 17th.

1995: Stowe took a total of 11 shots (2,3,2,3,1) at the Maiden (6th at Sandwich) to win the hole in each of their 5 games against Malvern. Richard Woods holed a 6I to bring Stowe's total to 11 shots (4 under 3s).

1999: The story going the rounds was that Gordon Taylor has moved from Gin and Tonic to whisky and water after he worked out that he spent over £1500 on tonic in the previous year.

1999: Julian Hill (Charterhouse) won a match 9/8 in the Hewitt and in the same year lost a match 9/8 in the Grafton Morrish. In the 9/8 win he struck the ball 12 times and had two conceded putts

2000: The Drive of Richard Hodgkinson (Repton) lipped out at the 6th at Deal and finished 15" away.

2000: A number of last minute withdrawals caused Mill Hill to search for a 5th pair. G. Hamilton-Andrews and C.G.Rose (aged 61 and 59 respectively) obliged giving a total of 119 years - a record for a debutante pairing?

How Far do different Schools Get?

You might find some use for this. This table shows how many times each school lost in a particular round

Early Hewitts (less than 6 rounds) are counted back from the final (so round 1 in 1924 counts as reaching round 3).

Some interesting points about finalists emerge

- Charterhouse have won 16 finals and lost 6
- Eton have never lost a final in 10 attempts
- Malvern have never won a final in 6 attempts
- Harrow have won 11 and lost 10 finals

At the other end:-

- 2 schools have never reached the 3rd round (Framlingham and Trent)
- 10 schools have never reached the 4th round
- 29 schools have never reached the 5th round
- 39 schools have never reached the final
- 46 schools have never won the final
